Innovative Diagnostic and Treatment Options for Non-Surgical Orthopedic Conditions with Dr. Marc Gruner, DO, MBA, RMSK, Thursday, January 14, 1-2:30pm. Dr. Gruner has trained with the leading experts in ultrasound and regenerative medicine at Mayo Clinic, acquiring expertise in cutting edge ultrasound-guided surgeries. Dr. Gruner will explore exciting and novel therapies in the areas of musculoskeletal, sports and regenerative medicine. The topics will include the use of ultrasound for diagnosing common orthopedic conditions in the office, tackling care from an integrative approach, and innovative treatments for common orthopedic injuries. Common conditions that will be addressed include Knee Osteoarthritis, Carpal Tunnel, Tennis Elbow, and Adhesive Capsulitis (Frozen Shoulder). A Conversation with Christina Puchalski, MD, Director of the George Washington University Institute for Spirituality and Health, Thursday, January 14, 4pm. Christina Puchalski, MD, MS, FACP, FAAHPM, is a pioneer and international leader in the movement to integrate spirituality into healthcare in clinical settings

and medical education. As founder and director of the George Washington Institute for Spirituality and Health (GWish) and Professor of Medicine at The George Washington University in Washington, DC, she continues to break new ground in the understanding and integration of spiritual care in healthcare settings. These programs and activities have encouraged the development of a patient-centered perspective. GWish is fostering alliances globally to further this integration. She developed the FICA spiritual history tool which is widely used in clinical settings. She is board certified in Palliative Care and Internal Medicine, directs an interdisciplinary outpatient supportive and palliative clinic and is a Medical Hospice Director in Washington, DC.

Dr. Puchalski is widely published in journals with work ranging from biochemistry research to issues in ethics, culture, and spiritual care. She has authored numerous book chapters and published the books *Time for Listening and Caring: Spirituality and the Care of the Seriously III and Dying*. She co-authored *Making Health Care Whole* with Dr. Betty Ferrell, based on consensus work resulting in guidelines for inter-professional spiritual care. She is co-editor of an international textbook on spirituality and health published by Oxford University Press. Her work has been featured on numerous print and television media. Her scholarship focuses on palliative care, spirituality and health and compassionate care as part of whole person health. She is recognized for her work in developing interdisciplinary educational curricula and innovated models of

Understanding the COVID-19 Vaccine Thursday, Jan. 14, 7 to 8 p.m. Join Charles E. Smith Life Communities as they welcome Drew Weissman, M.D., Ph.D to lead a discussion about the COVID-19 vaccine. It is no exaggeration to say that Drew Weissman is among a handful of scientists whose research is helping to save the world from COVID-19. Almost 23 years ago, Dr. Weissman began studying how messenger RNA (mRNA) could be used to create vaccines. Now his mRNA research underpins two of the leading coronavirus vaccines, one by Pfizer and the other by Moderna. Dr. Weissman is a professor of medicine at the Perelman School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. He received his undergraduate and master degrees in biochemistry from Brandeis University and his MD, PhD from Boston University. He is a member of The Association of American Doctors, and was recently awarded The Brandeis University Alumni Achievement Award and The Advocacy Award from Research America. Dr. Weissman states that "I've been

A Lab of One's Own: One Woman's Personal Journey Through Sexism in Science with Dr. Rita Colwell, Wednesday, February 24, 1-2:30pm. The featured guest is one of the top scientists in America and the groundbreaking microbiologist who discovered how cholera survives between epidemics. She is the former head of the National Science Foundation. A Lab of One's Own is a riveting memoir-manifest, documenting all Colwell has seen and heard over her six decades in science, from sexual harassment in the lab to obscure systems blocking women from leading professional organizations or publishing their work. Along the way, she encounters other women pushing back against the status quo, including a group at MIT who revolt when they discover their labs are a fraction of the size of their male colleagues. Resistance gave female scientists special gifts: forced to change specialties so many times, they came to see things in a more interdisciplinary way, which turned out to be key to making new discoveries in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. Dr. Colwell would also witness the advances that could be made when men and women worked together--often under her direction, such as when she headed a team that helped to uncover the source of the anthrax used in the 2001 letter attacks. A Lab of One's Own shares the sheer joy a scientist feels when moving toward a breakthrough and the thrill of uncovering a whole new generation of female pioneers. But it is also the science book for the #MeToo era, offering an astute diagnosis of how to fix the problem of sexism in science--and a celebration of the women who fought back.
