There are lots of phone and e-mail scams targeted at older adults. The Social Security Administration does not call people about their status or accounts. If you get a call claiming to be from the Social Security Administration, HANG UP.

The calls that tell you that you computer needs to be repaired also are scams. Do not provide any information to the called and HANG UP.

Be very cautious about making donations in response to computer messages or phone calls. You can ask the called to send you information in the mail.

Caregiving 101. Health Care Plans: Appealing Decisions. Consider this option if your health plan refuses to pay for care: contacting the Health Education and Advocacy Unit (HEAU) of the Maryland Attorney General's Office. The HEAU often succeeds in getting health plans to pay for treatment that was originally denied. In addition, it can help resolve billing disputes with health providers and warranty problems with hearing aids, eyeglasses, wheelchairs and other medical equipment. To reach the HEAU, call 410-528-1840 or email heau@oag.state.md.us If you or your doctor believe you need urgent care, but your health plan does not agree, call the Maryland

Insurance Administration's toll-free number (800-492-6116). The agency will render a decision within 24 hours and, in some situations, order a private plan to pay for the treatment.
